Choosing Godparents The Godparents – usually a Godmother and Godfather promise to help the parents raise the child in the practice of our Catholic Faith. In recognizing the importance of this role, to be called a Godparent, the Church requires that the person chosen be at least 16 years old, have received all the sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Communion) and be actively practicing the Catholic faith. This includes living a lifestyle consistent with the teachings of the Church. In this way the faith shared with the Godchild comes from a lived faith.

Question of the Week:

As you hear Jesus sending his disciples to teach in his name, what image comes to mind for you? What strikes you about the event?

Children: To whom would you announce the Good News about Jesus? Who do you think most needs to hear this message?

Youth/Adults: When Jesus sent the disciples out, he was preparing them for the future when he would be gone. How are you growing in your own faith & living as a Christian disciple? Why do you think Jesus sent them out two by two, rather than alone?



Immigration, the role of migrant workers, discussions re: DACA (the Dreamers), border walls, family togetherness, the need for workers have been front and center in the news these days. There are thousands of questions that are still unanswered regarding these issues; hopefully, one area, that of separated families, is getting sorted out and will come to a good conclusion.

This Sunday's first reading ironically begins with the words of a migrant worker, the prophet Amos. He tells us himself that he is "a shepherd and the dresser of sycamore trees." After he was done herding the sheep, it was his job to wander from sycamore grove to sycamore grove most likely following the crop as do young men and women in our country who move from state to state following the wheat crop or the peach orchards or other crops as they ripened.

The sycamore dresser had a difficult job. To make the fruit ripen in the nut, he had to pierce the fruit that was encased in husks with a sharp stick; after all that work, jabbing each nut with the stick which was pretty labor-intensive work, the yield wasn't really that great and produced a rather bland nut taste.

I often think of our own family. Every year dad and his brothers, in their teens, would join corn picking crews and move from state to state. They would start in Iowa and move to Nebraska and then South Dakota. All the picking was done by hand, pulling the ears off the stalks and throwing them into a wagon pulled by two mules. Some farmers asked them to husk the ears as they picked them, which added more time and work to the job. They developed very tough callouses even though they were wearing gloves. Work would begin at sunup and end at sundown. The only break was on Sunday, since the church laws of no work on Sunday were strictly observed, at least in Catholic country. What would they do with the money? They would send it back home so that the family would make it through the coming winter.

During the Dust Bowl days, my mother went with Grandpa and Grandma to California to pick oranges in the groves near Alhambra. Ma was only 16 at the time; she worked in the groves with Grandpa after getting in a few hours school each day. Grandma cleaned homes of the more established families who took pity on the "Iowa Okies" as they were called. They worked to make enough money to survive.

So many of the people who are coming to the USA from other countries are trying to do the same thing, just doing what they've got to do to survive. Of course my folks and perhaps some of yours were in different situations than the folks crossing the border. Our families were all from the same country and were working within the country. But that desire to feed and clothe the kids, the desire to keep a family together, the desire to escape from very dangerous areas are very strong motivations for people of all countries. We must have the right to control our borders, that's true, but what a miracle of grace it would be to find a way to help families who are in truly desperate need of help.

Pray for our lawmakers and president as they work to make a just and equitable solution. God bless us all.
