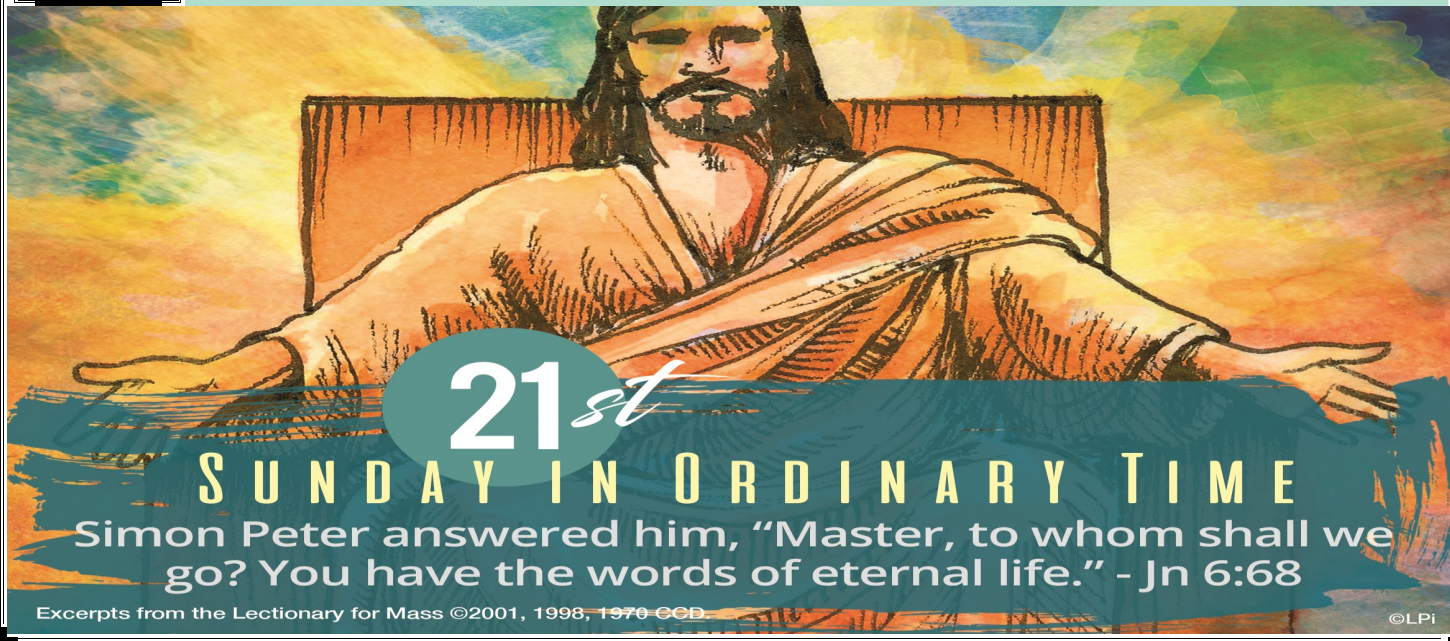




# Cathedral of the Sacred Heart

Some of the responses from the homeless included: Thank you, I was so hungry". "So happy that you are handing out lunches. There's nothing for us on Sunday". "We appreciate you so much". "God Bless the peanut butter angels". WOW! these bags of extras with hygiene stuff are great! we don't get these anywhere anymore'. " Thank you so much, this means so much, we are so hungry".

I found an article in America magazine that tackled an issue that is on the minds of many people in our society; that issue is how we talk to each other, how we keep civility in our thoughts, word, and actions and most importantly, how we follow Jesus’ command to love each other. It seems as though the prevailing way of dealing with others these days is incivility rather than civility. We know that that kind of language is all around us from talk shows to news reports to the language that comes out of our own mouths.

The article was written by the Bishop of Pittsburgh, Bishop David Zubik; I’ve used his ideas, not necessarily word for word, but hopefully in a way that expresses what he wished to say, and I hope that I do credit to his thoughts. He says that there are 9 things we can do to keep civility in our language and in our thoughts.

- 1.) Listening. It’s got to be more than “hearing.” Listening involves the work of hearing with the heart not just our ears.
- 2.) Presuming that we’re working for a common good. Instead of zeroing in on the differences that we have, find some space where we can stand together and then get to the rough stuff.
- 3.) Recognizing the validity of contending groups. “Democracy and freedom guarantee differences of convictions and conclusions.” Can we see potential validity in all who disagree with us?
- 4.) Respecting the person with whom I differ. Can I find something in their argument or presentation for which I can affirm them? Or find something in their talk that is even better than what I believe?
- 5.) Working for inclusion of all members of society, especially thinking of folks who are often considered marginalized or outside the norm.
- 6.) Distinguishing between facts and opinions. Am I sure of my facts or are they just my opinions?
- 7.) Being ready for passionate discussion. Can I critique an idea without lambasting or denigrating the person who has presented the idea? It’s not against civility to present one’s arguments with emotion.
- 8.) Getting the full story rather than assuming motives or judging people without knowing their background or environment.
- 9.) Willing to be self-critical. Can we examine our own positions that may lead us to ... (gasp) .... modify our own convictions?

Here’s Bishop Zubic’s summary of his thought. “Civility is a virtue, a habit of choices and conscience which shapes the way we encounter others. It does not come to anyone automatically. Like any virtue, we have to work at it day after day after day after day. But we must, it we are to work for policies that support and sustain human dignity, human rights, human life.”

I learned this virtue at home when dad became a member of the John Birch Society. We had some interesting conversations to say the least. I think that he thought of me as some pointy headed pinko liberal, but he never said it out loud. We always left each other on good terms. God bless us all.
